Greetings from the cabin,

Overheard on our camping trip with the four grandchildren: They were discussing what to do. One granddaughter, age 8 was giving instructions to the other three. Grandson, age 6 and brother to the granddaughter giving instructions, was not paying attention. One of the other granddaughters asks our grandson, "Did you hear what your sister just said?"

Grandson's response, "Blah, blah, blah."

There seems to be this continued push to bring our country back to its foundation of Christian morals and values. (I am not quite sure what that means or if it was ever there, but that is beside the point here.) I am all for living Christian morals and values. The question is, is that enough? If we talk living good Christian morals but do not live good ethics, all people are going to hear is, "Blah, blah, blah." If we push putting the Ten Commandments in our schools, but those who are pushing them do not live them, all our students are going to hear is, "Blah, blah, blah." If we tell our children not to bully or call other children names or make fun of them, and yet adults are posting memes on Facebook making fun of people they do like and congressional leaders calling their opponents names, all our children are going to hear is, "Blah, blah,"

A rich young ruler asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. He has kept all of the commandments. He has lived a morally right life. Jesus tells him that is good, but not enough. To truly inherit eternal life ... to fully enter the kingdom of God, one must look beyond oneself, do acts of compassion towards others, and trust God by following Jesus. Jesus was not condemning the man because he was rich. Jesus felt pity for the man because his wealth was preventing him from having compassion for others and trusting in God. In the same way, if we preach morality but we do not live out God's love through acts of justice and kindness, all people are going to hear is, "Blah, blah, blah."

I truly am concerned about our children and our youth. And it is not because of the way that they are acting or behaving. I am concerned about our children and our youth because of the way that many of our adults in our country, in our places of leadership, and even those who are professing to be God-fearing Christians are acting towards one another. We need to move beyond an understanding that salvation is just about where we might go after our deaths. Salvation ... experiencing eternal life ... life in God's presence begins here on earth. Salvation is about doing saving acts of compassion towards those we come in contact with on a daily basis. Eternal life begins now with how we live out God's love and compassion now.

As we approach another school year and especially Sunday school year, let us be conscious of what we are teaching our children, not through what we say, but how we act towards one another. May our acts of love, respect, and compassion for others speak louder than our words.


Redfield Senior Center Nutrition: Adopt A Senior!
